GLASS PIPE FACTORY A POSSI-BILITY.

Scranton Man Invents a Successful Method for Forming Tubes from Vitreous Matter and a Movement Is Afoot to Have Its Product Placed on the Market by a Scranton Company-Demand for Coal Is 400 foot hole. T. B. Howe, freight agent for the Lackawanna railroad at Green Ridge, and C. E. Wetmore, an employe of the been granted a patent on an apparatus for forming glass or vitreous pipe or tubular bodies, which will be used in the manufacture of glass tile, pipes, or condults.

The invention relates to improvements in apparatus designed for forming pipe from vitreous materials and especially such as are made plastic by heat-glass, for instance-and it has for its object to provide an apparatus which will form perfect pipe, cylin-drical in cross-section, if so desired, and with a minimum of labor and at-

tendance. The invention consists, primarily, in a rotary mold or succession of such molds, each arranged vertically and adapted for the reception of the molten or plastic material from a stationary feed, whereby the mass is distributed in the most perfect manner to secure homogeneity, and in pro-viding, in connection with such molds, longitudinally-movable cone, to gether with a similarly movable for mer for shaping the edge of the pipe. Mr. Wetmore is the originator of the

apparatus, and has a contract with Mr. Howe for placing his invention on the market. When seen by a Tribunman yesterday he stated that at present he does not know whether or no a stock company will be formed, but in all probability a plant will soon be established for manufacturing this wonderful commodity, which will virtually supplant the present sewer, gas, water and other pipe materials.

His invention differs from the Bonta

product of glass pipe in so far as it is nore perfect in its construction, and in the opinion of men who are experts along that line, it is bound to come into general use. There is a possibility of the patentees selling their invention, but at all events it will soon be placed on the market.
