

VERDICT IN FAVOR OF THE BOROUGH

J. D. STOCKER IS NOT ENTITLED TO DAMAGES.

That Was the Decision of the Jury Which Yesterday Passed Upon the Case-Jury in the Case of Wolfgang Against the Scranton Railway Company Will Present Its Verdict This Morning - Action Against the City to Recover \$3,000. Sheriff's Deeds Acknowledged.

Before Judge Kelly yesterday in the main court room the closing arguments made in the trespass case of E. J. Wolfgang against the Scranton Railway company. At 12.45 the case was given to the jury and at 5 o'clock last night it agreed and sealed its verdiet. After court opened in the morning Major Everett Warren, on behalf of the street railway company, asked for binding instructions to the jury, on the ground that Weiss, who drove Wolfgang's wagon at the time of the accident, was guilty of contributory negligence. Judge Kelly decided to allow the case to go to the jury, reserv-ing his decision on the point involved.

After the court opened in No. 3 the case of J. D. Stocker against the borough of Jermyn was resumed. The evidence closed Wednesday afternoon and yesterday morning Attorney H. W. New York, or John R. The Indian fired and ran forward to find that he had shot an old male woodchuck. whose hole was just where he had The hill was fairly honeycombed with the homes of these animals, and it may be that the scarcity of herbage impelled them to seek this unnatural food. Anyhow, the one in puestion had seized the little lamb by the throat and was evidently sucking its blood when killed. The hunter, believing the occurrence to have been accidental, continued his watch another day, and the chucks got away with two or three more lambs and ate portion of their carcasses.
