The great strike in the history of the world is drawing to a close. Already the great coal carrying railroads have agreed to increase your wages ten per cent, which is a great victory in itself. True, it is not enough, it does not satisfy us, but the time is not far distant when the anthracite coal miners will receive as much for their labor as any other class of workmen in the world.
