The year 1899 was admittedly a prosperous one with the farmers, but the value of nine of the principal crops of hat year, as compiled by the United tearly \$650,000,000 greater this year han last. The greatest increases were n corn and hay, but the farmer rerelyed more for every crop, excepting oats. 
