

# NOT OPPOSING THE VIADUCT

So its work satisfactorily it was the fault of the design. The law provides that where a manufacturer makes and sells a patented article of a staple standard variety, there is an implied guarantee that it will work. The machine company is trying to show that the Parsons shalting screen is not a standard, staple article of the kind contemplated by the law in question, and, consequently, there was no implied guarantee on their part.

It is further contended by the machine company, that the coal company did not give the screen a fair test, in that it did not properly set the timbers that were to receive it. In answer to this, the coal company says that it set the timbers according to a blue print furnished by the machine company and that it followed the plans exactly.

The case is being closely followed by many of the lawyers, because of the interesting questions it has developed.

### Work on Armory Building.

Work on the armory building is progressing very rapidly and Contractor Conrad Schroeder, who is in charge of the work of construction, confidently declares that he expects the big building will be completed by April. The workmen are now busied with work on the fourth and last floor of the main part of the building, that is the front section. The iron supply to be largely used in the building of the drill room is daily expected. This has been ordered from the Passaic Rolling Mill company of Paterson, N. J., and will get here within the next few days.

Immediately upon its arrival work will be continued upon this apartment, which when completed promises to be one of the largest and finest drill rooms in the state. It will be 155 feet broad by 240 feet long, and is to be 52 feet in height. Work will be continued on the building despite wind or snow, as the structure has now reached that stage where Contractor Schroeder can afford to laugh at winter. The roof is soon to be laid, and fortified by this and the steam pipes which are to be installed, the workmen will continue to labor through the chilliest days on the interior of the big edifice.

### Cannot Get Industrial Census.

Secretary Atherton, of the board of trade, recently wrote to the director of the census for the purpose of obtaining, if possible, a copy of the industrial census returns of the city of Scranton prior to the January meeting of the board. He received a reply yesterday, stating that it would be impossible to give out these returns for many months.

### Work Resumed at the Raymond.

After a nine months' idleness, the Raymond colliery in Archbald, lately owned by the Forest Mining company, and now operated by the New York, Ontario and Western Railroad company, yesterday resumed operations. During the long period of idleness which was caused by the dissatisfied employees going on strike, negotiations were on between the new companies, and the previous owners of the Raymond and the Raymond was transferred to the Elk Hill Coal and Iron company, which virtually means the Ontario and Western.

A committee of miners Wednesday waited on Superintendent Bryden and offered to resume work on the same agreement as the men in the company's other collieries, and work was accordingly begun yesterday. The Forest Mining company, which sold the colliery, was the successor to Jones, Simpson & Co., J. J. Williams of this city, and the heirs of the late Edward Jones, of Olyphant, were the principal stockholders.

District Passenger Agent J. E. Walsh, of the New York, Ontario and Western railroad, was yesterday, in Carbondale, the heart of employees of the Central Railroad of New Jersey, all along the line, were yesterday comforted by the pleasing spectacle of the pay car.

The new buildings for the Pan-American exposition, to be held in Buffalo in 1901 are now about completed and by special arrangement with the director general, holders of Lackawanna tickets will be admitted to the Pan-American grounds Nov. 29 and 30, free of charge.
