NO CHANGE IN COUNCILS

SPECIAL ELECTION DOES NOT ALTER STANDING. Each Ward Returned a Man of the Same Political Belief as the One Who Resigned—In Several of the Wards There Was a Spirited Battle and the Winners Had Only Small Leads—Details of the Vote for Each of the Candidates Given in Full.

The special elections held yesterday to fill the vacancies in the select and common councils, caused by the recent resignations of ten of the city fathers, resulted as follows:

COMMON COUNCIL. First Ward—John McDonald, R. Second Ward—H. S. Alworth, R. Third Ward—James Haggerty, D. Fourth Ward—W. W. Evans, R. Fifth Ward—Albert Lewis, R. Sixth Ward—Wm. Gurrell, D. Seventh Ward—Wm. Lewis, R. Eighth Ward—Wm. Rush, D.

SECOND WARD. H. S. Alworth, the Republican nominee, won out by a margin of nine over the Democratic nominee for common council, P. J. Flynn. J. K. Smith, the Citizens' candidate, received only 45 votes.

THIRD WARD. James Haggerty, the Independent candidate for common council in the Third ward, was elected. He is a Democrat. The vote:

EIGHTEENTH WARD. William Rush, the Democratic nominee for common council in the Eighteenth ward, was elected by a majority of thirty-five votes over Edward Williams, his Republican opponent.

TWENTIETH WARD. Only about half the registered vote participated in the Twentieth ward election. William G. O'Malley, master mechanic of the steel company, and former school controller from the union until the company's answer is received and the men are made cognizant of just what concessions will be granted.

FOURTH WARD. The Evans' received a large party vote, D. L. Morgan being the only other candidate to show any particular following. The vote in the four districts follows:
