ENGINEERING DEPARTMENT GOES TO HOBOKEN.

Force of D., L. & W. Employes Have Gone to the Eastern Terminus of the Road Where the Engineering Departments Are to Be Consolidated-Companies Are Ready to Begin Paying Semi-Monthly - Novel 6 New Year's Card Issued by the N. Y., O. & W. R. R .- Order Issued -y Superintendent Rine.

Division Engineer Fred Warner, together with his office force and effects, yesterday removed to Hoboken, where the local engineering department will be consolidated with that of Chief Engineer W. K. McFarland, who is now in the city making the final arrangements for the transfer. All of the local force will go to Hoboken except one man, who will be stationed here.

Division Freight and Passenger Agents Smith and Ten Brock will occupy the quarters being vacated by Engineer Warner, and the former's quarters will be utilized by the paymaster's department. The two rooms, which are on the same floor will be connected with an archway, and will thus afford much more room for handling the increased work of the paymaster's department.

Semi-Monthly Pay-Days.

The Delaware, Lackawanna and Western company will begin their payments for December among the mine workers, railroaders and other employes on January 5. The semimonthly pays will begin about the 15th of the month. With the increased office facilities afforded, the paymaster expects to do as much work in one day as was previously accomplished in a week. In this manner the semimonthly pays can be made successfully without inconvenience.

The Delaware and Hudson company will begin paying for December tomorrow and will conclude about the 20th of January. The semi-monthly distribution of January wages will begin about January 25th.

Similar arangements are also being made by many of the other coal companies in the anthracite regions.

The Brown Hoisting Mahinery company, of Cleveland, O., has already given out contracts to rebuild the buildings destroyed by fire on December 18. Most of the machinery was badly damaged. The firm had a large number of orders in hand and the fire was most unfortunate. The loss is estimated at \$500,000, fully covered by insurance.

CLAIM AGENT O'KEEFE HAS RESIGNED

Will Sever His Connection with Lackawanna Railroad on Jan. 15. Intends Going to Europe.

P. O'Keefe, chief claim agent of the Lackawanna railroad, yesterday morning tendered his resignation to General Superintendent T. E. Clarke, to take effect on January 15. Mr. O'Keefe has been with the company since March, 1899, and during his supervision of this important department it was thoroughly reorganized.

When seen by a Tribune man yesterday afternoon, Mr. O'Keefe confirmed the resignation, and gave as his reason has three liberal offers from Western railroads, some of which he has previously been identified with. He is also considering a proposition from the Pan-American Exposition company, of Buffalo, N. Y., to act as their chief of police during the exposition.

At present Mr. O'Keefe intends to take a much needed rest, and will sall the last week in January for a two months' visit with his brothers and sisters in the Emerald Isle. After his retirement from the Lackawanna company's service he will leave for Chicago, where he will spend a few days prior to his departure for New York, from which port he will sail for Europe.

Mr. O'Keefe has been identified with special railroad work for over twentysix years, and is one of the foremost and hest known men in the United States and Canada in his line. Prior to joining the Lackawanna's forces he was with the Illinois Central railroad from 1892 to 1899.

Among railroad men, Mr. O'Keefe is espected and admired from New York to Montreal and from Maine to San Francisco. He leaves the company with the best of good feeling, and with the assurance that he will always be held in kindly remembrance by the officials, and employes of the road and the people of Scranton.


