American navy will be a marked advance on former designs. The government is now constructing four harbor defense monitors, to be known as the Arkansas, Connecticut. Florida and Wyoming, with a singlebalanced turret containing two highpowered 12-inch breech-loading guns o be used with smokeless powder; four 4-inch rapid-fire breech-loading rifles; secondary battery, three 6pounder rapid-fire and four 1-pounder

automatic rifles. Length on water ne, 325 feet, breadth, 50 feet, Also eight battleships, to be known as the Georgia, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Virginia, Rhode Island, Maryland, Colorado and South Dakota, each to be of about 16,000 tons displacement, or over 5,000 tons heavier than the Oregon, over 100 feet longer than that famous vessel, and with it least three knots higher speed. Also six cruisers, three of which are to be called St. Louis, Milwaukee and Charleston, the other three yet to be named. These cruisers will each be of 14,000 tons, 23 knots speed, and 8,-600 miles' steaming radius and will be unmatched in the world. They will be 5,000 tons larger than the Brooklyn and at least three times as powerful for fighting uses. All of the above named vessels will be armor-coated from the extreme bow to stern and the most formidable ever built. The
