

The aldermanic contests in the Fourteenth, Sixteenth and Twentieth wards and the fight for common council in the Eleventh furnished practically the only enthusiasm and liveliness of the day. The polling places in each of these three wards were surrounded with large throngs of the friends and supporters of the rival candidates, and gument was indulged in.
