NORTH SCRANTON

A DISASTROUS FIRE ON PROVIDENCE ROAD.

The Two-Story Brick Residence of Nathan Thompson Destroyed by Fire Yesterday Morning—The Fire Hydrants Were Frozen and It Was Fifteen Minutes Before Water Was Had—Initial Supper to Be Given by Ladies of the Christian Church. Miss McHale Surprised.

Frozen fire hydrants were yesterday morning responsible for the spread of a fire in this part of the city which did \$2,000 damage before it was placed under control. The blaze started in a most peculiar and as yet unexplained manner at 2:50 o'clock in the dining room of the two-story brick residence of Nathan Thompson, situated on Providence road, almost within a stone's throw of the newly erected Niagara hose house. The alarm was turned in from box 73 by Mr. Thompson's son who says he discovered the blaze by the smell of smoke and aroused the family.

The Niagara, Liberty and Excelsior responded to the alarm but after they got their hose laid and all attached it was found that all the hydrants in the neighborhood were frozen. The general fire engine was then telephoned for and finally it arrived. The firemen were helpless. The flames kept increasing but they could do nothing to check them.

It was perhaps after fifteen minutes before the steamer had arrived and had forced the ice out of the hydrants. Streams were then got on the fire but it was not extinguished until the house had been almost entirely destroyed. The residence of Patridan Palmer next door was in danger nearly all the time but the patrolman did valiant service with a garden hose. The loss to the property from damage except for a slight scorching.

The loss to the Thompson property is placed at \$2,000. It was to have been sold on March 15 by the sheriff on an execution secured by the Scranton Savings bank. Val Burley, of the Liberty, had one of his eyes badly burned by a spark while assisting at the fire. A slight blaze in a house on Wilbur street, owned by Charles Sweeney and occupied by a Polish family, called out the North Scranton companies again yesterday afternoon about 1:30 o'clock. The fire was caused by some one carelessly throwing out a frozen water pipe and was extinguished with the aid of a few pails of water.
