STRIKE AT THE DOLPH COLLIERY IS AT AN END.

Differences That Existed There Have Been Adjusted in an Amicable Manner—Organizer Dilcher Has Returned to the City—Limits of the Taylor Yard Have Been Changed—Improvements That Are Being Made Along the Lackawanna Road—Board for Today.

The strike at the Dolph colliery, at Jessup, has been settled and the five hundred employees were all back to work yesterday morning. The strike was declared Saturday night as a result of the non-payment of the 10 per cent. increase to a number of the strikers and the dismissal of two men, one of them a committeeman.

Secretary Dempsey, of the mine workers, had a conference with Manager Robertson, of the company, Monday, at the conclusion of which Mr. Robertson granted the demands of the strikers and agreed to reinstate the two men who were discharged.

This was reported to the strikers' officers, with the effect that the strike was declared off and the men instructed to return to work yesterday morning.

Dilcher in the City.

National Committeeman Frederick Dilcher arrived in the city yesterday afternoon from his home at Nelsonville, O. He was met by several local members of the United Mine Workers and will make his headquarters here for some time. The convention at Hazleton in March of the three anthracite districts, at which the coal operators are expected to meet with the mine leaders, will be attended by Mr. Dilcher.

Various matters of importance to the miners of this district will be looked into and adjusted by the big committeeman during his visit.

Notice to Conductors.

A notice has been posted on the Lackawanna bulletin board from General Passenger Agent T. W. Lee, referring to a circular issued some time ago, containing the question of passengers with continuous passage tickets. The notice is issued to the passenger conductors and states that in reference to circular No. 413, of Jan. 10, 1901, that on and after that date, no stopovers will be allowed on tickets of any description, regardless of date of issue, whether of the Lackawanna company's issue, or connecting lines, except the regular summer tourist and editorial tickets, a number of rules which follow the announcement are to be observed.

If a passenger traveling on a continuous ticket, except as specified in the circular, applies for a stop-over, conductors are expected to notify him that stop-overs are not granted. However, no objection will be made to the train short of his destination and demands his ticket, return same, providing fare is forthcoming to cover the ride as far as the point where he leaves the train.

In case he wishes it to a point short of his destination, the ticket will be cancelled, and forwarded to the auditor of the freight and ticket accounts, being sent attached to a special form provided for this purpose, and a statement accompanying it, containing advice governing the matter. A receipt for the ticket, in all such cases will be issued to the passenger, stating that upon application to the passenger office proper allowance will be made.

No tickets will be allowed to be issued to a passenger holding a ticket beyond the conductor's run or to a passenger holding a ticket to a point at which the train is not scheduled to stop.

Yard Limits Changed.

A bulletin from Division Superintendent E. J. Tinsley, of the Lackawanna railroad, states that a change was made in the yard limits in the Taylor yard.

The yard limit board at the east end has been moved back in easterly direction about thirty-five feet length, in order to protect the crossover just put in at Minooka junction. Trains are expected to be governed accordingly.

Lackawanna Improvements.

Improvements of an important nature to accommodate the rapidly increasing traffic of the Lackawanna railroad are being made between Hazleton and Buffalo. Every department in the service is over-rushed with work. A. H. Ruder, superintendent of signals, is making arrangements to equip the road with automatic home and distant signals. This work is now going on between Bridgeville and Manunka Chunk.

The east-bound track between Stroudsburg and Manunka Chunk and the west-bound track between that point and Scranton are being equipped with electric home and distant signals with interlocking points at Pocono Summit.
