CORONER ASKED TO INVESTI-GATE THE CHILD'S DEATH.

Jury Empanelled to Hear the Testimony of Those Who Are Familiar with the Case-Dr. Sweet Will Preach a Series of Special Sermons. Two Funerals Yesterday-Jackson Street Church Notes-Meetings of Wheelmen-Other Notes and Personals of an Interesting Nature.

A peculiar case was brought to the attention of the coroner yesterday, Later developments made throw more light on the case. On Sunday, March 3, Albert, the young son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Colvin. of 2023 Price street itied as a result of burns received by falling into a sub of boiling water.

The child was 3 years of uge, and according to the story of the case told by the grandmother, Mrs. O'Malley, was playing in the kitchen of his home where the woman was filling a tub with boiling water. When her back was turned the child fell in and was terribly scalded. The child's scream: attracted the neighbors, and he was rescued after being badly scalded.

Dr. J. J. Brennan, of Jackson street was called and did everything possible to relieve the boy's sufference, but without avant. The body was interred in the Carnellert cemetery Tuesday of ternoon. The father and mother of the child were absent from home when the death occurred and did not return until after the funeral.

When the father asked Mrs. O'Malley about the case he was informed that the boy had died from an attack of brain fever. Mr. Colvin regarded this statement with suspicion and sought Dr. Brennan, who informed him of the
