BURGESS BURCHELL SENDS MESSAGE TO COUNCIL.

Important Session of the Borough Fathers Held, in Addition to Reading of Burgess' Letter. Much Business Being Transacted—Committees Appointed for the Year. Sunday's Storm Played Havoc with Dunmore Wires and Interfered with the Fire Alarm System.

The council met in regular session last night. The burgess read his annual message, which is appended.

The population of Dunmore, according to the last census, exceeds 2,000, an increase of 15 per cent. during the last decade, and from previous indications we shall have a population of 3,000 within the next ten years.

The preliminary work for the construction of the sewerage system having been about completed, the council of contracts and other matters pertaining thereto, will engage much of the council's attention during the coming year.

The various districts of the borough are to be under the care of the councilmen, as follows: First ward, First district, Peyton, First ward, Second district, and Fourth ward, M. Miller.

The election of P. J. Tavan as chief engineer of the fire department was confirmed, as were also his appointments of L. P. Wert, of the Neptune company, and William Beckman, of the Independents, as first and second assistants.

The appointment of three permanent men and purchase of horses for the fire department has pleased the well organized and thoroughly equipped department upon a firm and reliable basis.

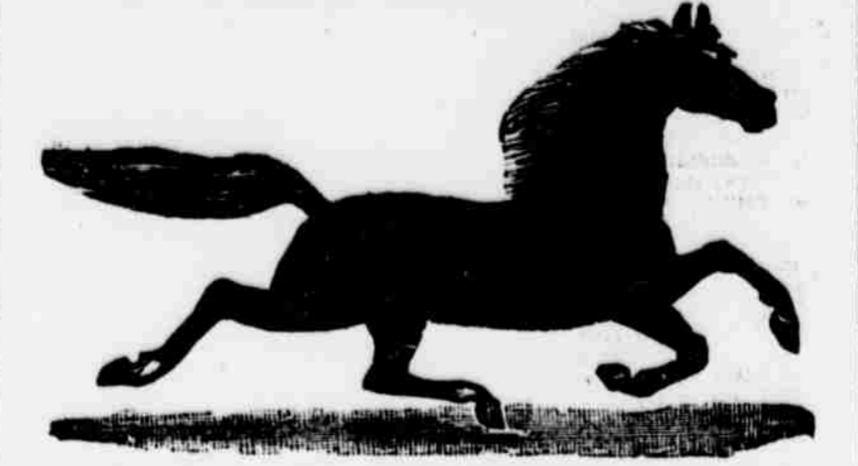
