DUNMORE DOINGS MEETING OF SCHOOL BOARD LAST NIGHT.

A Large Amount of Business Was Transacted as the Session Was the First Held in Some Time—Rev. Lyman D. Weeks Will Deliver a Lecture Tonight on "The Passion Play"—Japanese Wedding Will Be Repeated—Other News Notes.

After several unsuccessful attempts the school board met last night with Messrs. Corbly, Webber, Irwin and Haggerty present. Mrs. James Golden, Mrs. Patrick Doud, Mrs. Gilligan and the William McDonough estate were exonerated from their taxes. A large number of bills were ordered paid, and the pay-roll for month ending March 7, amounting to \$2,444.29, was approved.

A resolution was offered by Mr. Irwin empowering the officers of the board to demand the books relating to the business of the board, of any previous officer of the board, and any providing for the purchase of such books as may be required to keep in the future a proper record of the board's financial condition.

This is made necessary from the fact that the board is confronted by a indebtedness of nearly \$20,000, and the books are in such a muddled condition that it is impossible to arrive at the exact standing. The board contemplates an issue of bonds very soon, and before this can be done a statement of the financial condition must be certified to and filed with the clerk of the county.

The superintendent's report showed an enrollment for the last month of 2,459; average attendance, 2,095; percentage of attendance, 85. Superintendent Bovard, who recently attended a state meeting of superintendents at Harrisburg, informs the board that our schools compare very favorably with those in the Capital city.
