TWO NEW LOCOMOTIVES ARE RECEIVED.

They Will Be Used in the Passenger Service of the D. L. & W.—Grievance Committee of the Lackawanna Conductors in the City—Lackawanna Newspaper Special Will Go to Buffalo Today—Make-up of the D. L. & W. Board—Weekly Conference Held.

No. 923 and No. 924, two of the new passenger locomotives being built by the Schenectady Locomotive works for the Lackawanna Railroad company, arrived in the city yesterday and were promptly inspected by the officials and employees of the company.

In fact, all the designs worked out by Superintendent Lloyd have been embodied in the locomotives capable of surmounting the many steep grades on the Lackawanna railroad with comparative ease.

In the cab were traveling Engineer W. A. Buckhoe, of the Schenectady Locomotive works; H. W. Lowther, chief clerk to Superintendent Lloyd; Engineer Marvin Zander and Fireman Robert Harris, and a Tribune man.

A noticeable feature of the new engines are the enlarged grates and heating service, the fire-box being the largest on any passenger engine in the United States.

The boiler is 60 inches in diameter, and there are 282 tubes or flues, 14 foot 4 inches long.

The cylinders are 29 inches in diameter, with a 29 inch stroke, and the four steel drive wheels are each 69 inches in diameter.

These locomotives are equipped with all modern appliances, such as air-brakes, automatic bell hangers, lubricators, pneumatic sanding devices and improved shunting gears.

All of this series will be utilized by the Lackawanna railroad in their main line passenger service, and if the trains are not on time it will not be the fault of the engine.
