He gave a thrilling description of the long trip which lasted about forty-five days from their station to the coast.

In the party when they started on that perilous trip were a lady and her children, Mr. Dreyer and Mr. Lokey, who at the time of starting was suffering from a severe fever, being delirious much of the time. The speaker drew a very graphic picture of the death of the two children of Mr. and Mrs. Lokey, the death occurring about two weeks ago.

Through all this perilous trip he said the only amusement in their minds was the fear of death, but rather that death might be suggested in their bodies either in life or death. When they started their journey coastward under escort of a company of soldiers they had altogether about 800 cases of silver. They were told before they had traveled eight miles that the party had been robbed of some 200 cases, while their supposed protectors looked on. Mr. Dreyer commented that he had been assuming his duties as the chief's opportunity and hoped to return to his old station.

He regards the recent trouble as a passing storm, still hoping the Chinese will consider them, as a whole, a peace loving people and points to the fact that during the thirty-three years previous to the present trouble the China inland mission had not lost a life through violence.

At the conclusion of his remarks a collection was taken amounting to over \$80 for the Young Ladies' Mission society.
