FERDINAND AND ISABELLA.
Senora Blanca, Countess de Oves, is a Spanish lady of title. One of her ancestors, Count Remiro de Oves, gave two thousand pesos (then a large sum of money) toward the equipment of the fleet in which Columbus sailed, and the Countess has now in her possession a parchment signed by Ferdinand and Isabella, thanking Count Remiro for his gift.

The family of the Countess has for generations been near the throne of Spain, and one her family (Count Louis de Oves) signed with John Quincy Adams when Florida was ceded to the United States by treaty in 1819.

Breaker at Wilkes-Barre Being Reconstructed.

It Belongs to the Pennsylvania Coal Company and When Completed Will Have a Daily Capacity of 2,000 Tons.—An Overall Man's Modest Offer—Jersey Central Officials in Town—Make-up of the D. L. & W. Board for Today—Other Interesting Industrial News.

The following is from the Pittston department of Tuesday's Wilkes-Barre Record:

The Pennsylvania Coal Company is contemplating several improvements in this locality that seem considerable to our town. The work toward the reconstruction of the breaker at Wilkes-Barre is going on apace. There has been outward indications of the work being practically at a standstill, but this is not so. The company has been necessarily delaying in its work on a progressive adjustment of the insurance rates. This adjustment having now been made, there is nothing now to delay the desire of the company to expedite the reconstruction.

Central Railroad Orders.
Central trains must not exceed a speed of four miles per hour passing over the Main street road crossing at East 11th and Benton, and an additional safeguard one of the brakemen must in every instance precede the train over the crossing to warn pedestrians of the approach of the train.

A Modest Offer.
As an instance of the modest, violet like nature of some men, Secretary Atkinson read at Monday night's meeting of the board of trade a communication from the proprietor of an out of the city overalls factory. The latter stated that he is determined to move his place and will establish the industry in any city making him the best offer. What he insists on, however, is that a 4,500 two-story building, well lighted and with steam heat, fitted with a 50 horse power engine, boiler and water, be furnished, and that the factory be exempt from taxes excepting the county tax, which he thinks should be reduced half.
