ACCIDENT IN A GRAVEYARD

REMAINS EXPOSED TO THE ELEMENTS UNINTENTIONALLY.

Coffin and Rough Box Fell Into the Grave While Mourners Looked on with Amusement—Electric City Wheelmen and William Connell Glee Club Meetings—Samuel Morgan's Friends Postpone Action Until Next Sunday—Two Funerals Yesterday—Other News Notes.

A most unfortunate accident occurred at the Cathedral cemetery yesterday morning, when the remains of the late Mrs. P. M. Egan were about to be lowered into the grave. The coffin had been removed from the hearse and stood upon the rough box, which was resting on the lowering stand used to drop the box into the grave. Just as the men in charge were ready to lower the coffin, in some unaccountable manner the rough box slipped from its position, falling into the grave, and carrying the coffin with it. One end of the coffin was broken open and the remains were partially exposed to the elements.

DR. MONTGOMERY'S LECTURE.
He Will Be Heard at the High School Friday.
Dr. Thomas H. Montgomery, Jr., of the University of Pennsylvania, will deliver a lecture to the pupils of the Scranton High school on Friday afternoon, March 29th. His subject will be the "Migration of Birds." Dr. Montgomery acquired his knowledge of this subject as director of the Nature Study Course at the Marine Biological Laboratory, at Woods Hole, Mass., which is a co-operative institution, with which the University of Pennsylvania and some sixty other universities, museums, and institutions, interested in biology, are connected, and which has been a very important factor in the advancement of biological work.
