

STORY OF CAPTURE OF AGUINALDO

Graphic Account of General Funston's Exploit.

GENERAL MACARTHUR'S OFFICIAL CABLEGRAM

Gives Notice of the Success of the Expedition—General Funston's Description of the Trip Into the Mountains in Search of the Insurgent Chief—A Ninety Mile March Upon Rations of Parched Corn—Funston Imprisoned Three Days at Cosiguan—A Thrilling Tale of Adventure Surpassing the Efforts of Writers of Border Fiction—Aguinaldo Fears Imprisonment at Guam—General Funston to Be Substantially Rewarded.

Washington, March 28.—A cablegram received at the war department late this morning from General MacArthur tells in a succinct way the history of Aguinaldo's capture, gives all the credit for the brilliant exploit to General Funston, whose name, he suggests, should be that of the hero of the exploit.

On the right of March 8 the party embarked on the United States gunboat Vicksburg. It was originally intended to take Cosiguan from the island of Polillo to the island of Mindoro.

On the morning of March 22 the advance was resumed. The column was met by the staff officers of Aguinaldo and a detachment of Aguinaldo's bodyguard which was ordered to take charge of the Americans.

The Macabebes opened fire, but their aim was rather ineffective, and only three insurgents were killed. The rebels returned the fire.

GENERAL FUNSTON'S ACCOUNT.
