TOO ENTHUSIASTIC.

One of the Results of the Boycott on the Scrantonian.

The local agent made up for this by inducing a corober of heys to fry and sell it on the street. When these boys appeared with a bundle of the papers under their erms and attempted to dispose of them by sale, they were surrounded by crowds of urchins and assailed by a variety of uncomplimentary names and

This was not all. According to some witnesses, the boys were subjected to phyrical violence, and among those who suffered in this way was young Frank. It is allested that Tyler kicked him severely. The matter was aled to rest until Thursday, when J. J. Niland, the circulation manager of the Scrantonian, came to town, heard from young Frank the story of the assault and the two went before Alderman Atkinson, of the Fourth ward. that evening, laid information against Tyler, and his arrest followed yesterday morning. Tyler has been employed on the night shift at the Klots silk mill in Suppon.

When Constable Moran arraigned his prisoner before Alderman Atkinson yesterday morning, the young fellow at once pleaded guilty, evidently not realizing the gravity of the charge. When the alderman held him in \$200 for bail he appeared greatly surprised and said that he didn't know he was doing wrong when he kicked a newsboy who was selling a boycotted paper. seemed to think that the law would sustain him in thus helping to suppress a sheet he had been told was un-

Alderman Atkinson asked him If there was any one who would furnish \$200 ball for his appearance before the grand jury. The boy said there was not, so Constable Moran took him to the county juil at noon yesterday.
