ALBERT T. PATRICK PLACED ON TRIAL

REPUBLICANS WIN IN DENVER.

Denver, Colo., April 2.—Partial returns last night from all the wards of the city indicate a sweeping victory for the Republican ticket. Leading Democrats concede the election of the body of the Republican ticket by 4,000 to 2,000 plurality, while claiming the majority in doubt. The council will be elected.

COLLIERIES CLOSED.
