# **NEWS OF THE** LABOR WORLD

CONVENTION OF THE MINE WORKERS AT OLYPHANT.

Over Three Hundred Delegates, Representing the Miners of the First District, Are in Session-Opening of Convention Preceded by a Parade-Conference with Reference to the Silk Strike to Be Held Tonight-Make-up of the Board for Today-Odds and Ends.

Three hundred and ten delegates, representing one hundred and sixtytwo locals of the First district, United Mine Workers of America, essembled yesterday at Olyphant in answer to the call for the quarterly convention. The two sessions of the day were presided over by President Thomas D. Nicholis, of Nanticoke, and consisted of the routine work of examining cre-

dentials and appointing committees. This morning the real business of the convention will be started, when the annual reports of the officers will received. Yesterday morning's meeting was preceded by a parade of the Dickson City, Priceburg, Winton, Throop. Olyphant and Peckville locals, over two thousand men being in line. Bonn's band led the procession, and President Nicholls acted as grand marshal, Stephen Reap, John Komoro. David H. Davis and Daniel Parry acting as his aides.

The convention is being held at the Father Mathew Opera House, and will probably continue for several days, as there is a large amount of very important business upon which action is to be taken, matters which will make material changes in the district and render this convention one of the most memorable in its history.

The morning session was called to order about 10 o'cock by President Nicholls. Seated upon the stage were "Mother" Mary Jones, the well-known female organizer, and the district officers. The latter are: President Nicholls, Vice President Adam Byscavage, of Plymouth: Secretary-Treasurer John T. Dempsey, of this city, and the following executive board members: John P. Kearney, of Archbald; Henry Collins, of Carbondale; John Fallon, of Wilkes-Barre; F. J. Llewellyn, of Avoca. District Organizer R. A. Courtright, Anthony Schlosser, M. D. Flaherty and others were also pres-

Shortly after the opening of the necting. President Nicholls appointed the following credentials committee: Reese, of Olyhpant: Duggan, of Olyphant: Walsh, of Carbondale: Price, of this city, and Thaine, of Wilkes-The remainder of the morning session was taken up in the examination of delegates' papers, and when the afternoon session was called the committee reported that all credentials had been to and correct, and three hundred and ten delegates were present, The report was accepted. ness of the day, and the delegates spent the remainder of the afternoon in discussing local conditions and in listening to addresses by "Mother" Jones and Burgess John Manning, of Olyphant. The latter welcomed the delegates to the town, and spoke interestingly along the lines of labor unionism. Mother Jones gave a vigorous harangue, in which she urged the necessity of perfecting organization among the miners. She also discoursed generally along the lines of unionism.

This morning Secretary-Treasurer Dempsey will give his report, and it is also expected that President Nicholis will make a statement regarding the results of the visits of the legislative ommittee to Harrisburg to secure destrable mining legislation

Action will be taken by the convenion today or tomorrow upon the adoption of the new constitution and bylaws, revised at the Edwardsville convention in January. The important question of division of the district will also come up for action, and it is, moreover, expected that this convention will take some action in reference to the preventing of petty local strikes, called without consulting the execu-tive officers. An entertainment will be given tonight, at which Mother Jones will speak.

### The Silk Workers.

A meeting will be held at 6 o'clock this evening at Economy hall, between the executive committee of the triking textile workers and the special committee appointed at Sunday's neeting of the Central Labor union, with instructions to attempt to obain a meeting with Superintendent Davis, of the Sauquoit mill.

At this evening's meeting various plans will be discussed of reimbursing the stender treasury of the strikers, and methods planned of enlisting the efforts of the various locals in their behalf. The matter of meeting Davis will also be acted upon, and it is likely that within a few days the Sauquoit superintendent will be waited upon by the Central Labor union representa-

The strikers' executive committee met yesterday and discussed the question of sending delegates to the nawhich is to be held May 6, at Holyoke, Mass. Meetings are to be called for the various locals, who will elect their

own representatives to the assembly. There is talk of another big mass meeting and a committee was yesterday appointed to select a hall, and make other arrangements for such ; gathering. Tomorrow the local executive committee members will go to Pittston and there hold joint session with the Pittston and Wilkes-Barre slik strikers. It is expected that Secretary Morgan, of the Paterson union, will be present and report on the ac-tion taken by the New Jersey girls regarding the distribution of aid. The

# UNITED STATES COURT.

Adjourned March Term Will Open in This City at 10 O'Clock This Morning.

The March adjourned term of the district court of the United States for the western district of Pennsylvania will be held in this city during the week, and promptly at 10 o'clock this morning the court will be opened by Crier Snyder. Judge W. W. Acheson, of the circuit court, and Judge Joseph Buffington of the district court, will be

the presiding officers. The officers of the court and grand and petit jurors arrived in the city yesterday, and last night there were egistered at the Hotel Jermyn Judges Acheson and Buffington, United States Attorney D. B. Heiner, of Armstrong ounty; his assistants, D. M. Miller, of Pittsburg, and J. N. Laugham, of In-diana: United States Marshal Fred C. Leonard, of Potter county; Clerk W. T. Lindsay, of Pittsburg: Deputies J. H. Irons and J. W. Snyder, and a large

number of the jurors. The session will be a short one and by Thursday it is expected that all the eriminal cases will be disposed of.

Judge Acheson will today preside

over the court room in which are argued the civil cases, while Judge Buf-lington will be in charge of the criminal court. This is the latter's final appearance in this city as a presiding United States officer, as by the creation of the new district Judge R. W.

Archbald will take his place. The trial list, which the court offiials brought with them, merely contains a number of old indictments. None of the new cases are upon it There are three new civil cases and fourteen criminal proceedings, which will be handled during this week. The ase against Frank Jones, of this city, is one of them. There are two other similar cases which will be passed upon, and three counterfeiting cases. Persons arrested for complicity in two rather trivial postoffice robberies, which occurred in this county, are also slated to come up for trial. There are hree cases of arrests made of persons charged with a fraudulent use of the mails, and a trio of "moonshining" indictments.
