

NEWS OF THE LABOR WORLD CONVENTION OF THE MINE WORKERS AT OLYPHANT.

Over Three Hundred Delegates, Representing the Miners of the First District, Are in Session—Opening of Convention Preceded by a Parade—Conference with Reference to the Silk Strike to Be Held Tonight—Make-up of the Board for Today—Odds and Ends.

Three hundred and ten delegates, representing one hundred and sixty-two locals of the First district, United Mine Workers of America, assembled yesterday at Olyphant in answer to the call for the quarterly convention.

The two sessions of the day were presided over by President Thomas D. Nichols, of Nanticoke, and consisted of the routine work of examining credentials and appointing committees.

This morning the real business of the convention will be started, when the annual reports of the officers will be received. Yesterday morning's meeting was preceded by a parade of the Dickson City, Peshoburg, Winton, Throop, Olyphant and Peckville locals, over two thousand men being in line.

The convention is being held at the Father Mathew Opera House, and will probably continue for several days, as there is a large amount of very important business upon which action is to be taken.

Shortly after the opening of the meeting, President Nichols appointed the following credentials committee: Reese, of Olyphant; Dugan, of Olyphant; Walsh, of Carbondale; Pugh, of this city, and Rhimes, of Wilkes-Barre.

This practically concluded the business of the day, and the delegates spent the remainder of the afternoon in discussing executive committee and listening to addresses by "Mother" Jones and Burgess John Manning, of Olyphant.

The silk workers' meeting will be held at 6 o'clock this evening at Economy hall, between the executive committee of the striking textile workers and the special committee appointed at Sunday's meeting of the Central Labor union.

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The strikers' executive committee met yesterday and discussed the question of sending delegates to the national convention of Textile Workers, which is to be held May 6, at Holyoke, Mass.

There is talk of another big mass meeting and a committee was yesterday appointed to select a hall, and make other arrangements for such a gathering.
