VAUGHAN WAS NOT CONSULTED

STREET RAILWAY ORDINANCE CALLED UP.

> An Effort Made to Have Action Indefinitely Postponed, but Mr. Vaughan Succeeded in Having the Measure Laid on the Table, After Pouring Out a Little Hot Shot. Resolution Directing City Clerk Not to Present Ordinances to Recorder-War on Flat Wheels.

As predicted in yesterday morning's Tribune, the ordinance granting a franchise to the Central Rapid Transit company was called up in select council last night by its opponents, with the view of giving it its quietus, but by a clever move, its father, D. W. Vaughan, succeeded in turning the tables on those behind the scheme.

The measure was called up on sec end reading by Mr. Schneider. Clerk Lavelle had no sooner read the title of the measure than Mr. McAndrew was on his feet with a motion to postpone action indefinitely, because, as he said, "of the objection to putting street car tracks on Wyoming avenue." Mr. Schneider seconded the

Mr. Vaughan remarked that he had a few words to say before the mo-tion was put. "I am very sorry," said he, "that these gentlemen are taking so much interest in this ordinance, They're forcing it to an issue when we do not desire this to be done. The gentleman who is backing this or-dinance is sick in New York city and has requested that it be not called up until he returns. of the appropriation committee of the

"These people are chasing up this ordinance because they want to kill it. This is the first time since I have been in council that an ordinance has been called up when the man that introduced it didn't want it called up. Give this new company a fair chance If you want to kill the ordinance walt till the men who want it passed call it up and kill it in the open, but don't play any such tricks as this,"

LAID ON THE TABLE.

Mr. Vaughan then moved that the ordinance be laid on the table. President Chittenden ruled that this mo tion took precedence over Mr. Mc Andrews' and it was put and passed, taking the wind completely out of the sails of the other crowd. It can now be taken from the table at any time

As exclusively mentioned in yesterday's Tribune, Mr. Vaughan introduced a resolution directing the city clerk not to present to the recorder for that official's signature any ornnance or resolution passed by councils except general or special appropriation ordinances. The resolution set forth that it is the intent of the ripper bill that all ordinances and resolutions except those above mentioned become effective immediately upor their passage by councils.

President Chittenden suggested that it might be wise to refer the resolu tion to the city solicitor for an opin

"Oh, what's the use?" languidly remarked Mr. Clemons, who was leaning back in his chair with an expansive smile on his face. The resolution was not referred, but was passed unanimously.

Mr. Vaughan also offered a resolu tion directing the city controller not to approve of any bills or draw warrants for the same which have not been passed by the joint auditing committee, except the city pay-rolls. This resolution was also adopted by a unanimous vote

Mr. Costello presented a communication addressed to him by City Solicitor Watson, in response to his inquiry as to how the ordinance establishing water rates could be enforced. The city solleiter in his communication stated that while he was anxious to make the fight to compel the company to abide by the provisions of the ordinance, that nevertheless be felt unable to do so just at present without the assistance of additional counsel, on account of the great mass of city business requiring his attention.

WILL BE FOUGHT. He pointed out that any effort made o compel an enforcement of the ordlnance would be bitterly fought by the water company, which he referred to as "a most strongly intrenched corporation," but said he was ready at any time to consult with councils regarding the best means of bringing the matter to an Issue.

Mr. Costello moved that a committee of three, with the president as an exofficio member, be appointed, and the motion prevailed. President Chittenden appointed as members of this committee Messrs. Costello, Clemons and Merriman

Mr. Melvin called up the ordinance appropriating \$186.90 for the payment of a claim of the Barber Asphalt company for the paving of a certain portion of Penn avenue. This claim has been the subject of a deal of discussion, it being claimed that the city is not liable for its payment. Vaughan, who had before threatened that he would kill the ordinance moved that it be referred to the city solicitor for an opinion as to its legality. The motion was defeated by the following vote:

The ordinance was then passed on third and final reading, as were also the following: Providing for the paying of a portion of South Main avenue; providing for the paving of Court street, Diamond avenue and part of Providence road: providing for the laying of flagstone sidewalks on portions of Cedar avenue. When the ordinance providing for

the paying of a portion of Washburn street came up, council went into committee of the whole, on motion of Mr Morgan, for the purpose of amendment. A section of the ordinance provided that the city should pay for the paving at the intersection of streets. Mr. Chittenden moved that this be stricken out, and his motion found a warm second in Mr. Clemons, who said that the city had never before paid for the payement at the intersection of streets and who didn't see any reason why councils should make fish of one

and fowl of another.' Mr. Oliver, who was in the chair, explained that the petition for the pave was conditional upon the insertion of this particular section in the ordinance. Council decided, however, to strike it out.
