HE Oneonta Star has this to say of Rev. J. B. Sweet, D. D., formerly pastor of the Simpson M. E. church, who is now in charge of the Oneonta church.

John B. Sweet, D. D., was granted by large congregation a year ago two months ago, and much love to those present. The reverend gentleman speaks apparently without notes of any kind. He is a fluent, pleasing speaker, uses choice English and, although he talks rapidly, is easily followed because systematic in his line of thought. His style is clear and bold, and his manner of delivery is appropriate, leaving auditors to make the application. At the morning service the church was crowded. INTRODUCTION.—It should be remembered that the life of Jesus Christ in this world had constant reference to the welfare of men. He taught and acted for the good of others. He was so filled with the spirit of benevolence that He planned to be a blessing after leaving the world. It was for this purpose that He selected a company of disciples, that He gathered them together, and taught them the way of salvation, that they might be witnesses and representatives, that in fact He might perpetuate His name and enlarge His work by them. This plan shaped His course of procedure. He left many things undone for them to do. His post-mortem work and influence were all directed to them. We have seen how by different methods at various times, He has called certain persons and brought them into close sympathy with His purposes. The women, the two journeying to Emmaus, the ten in the upper room, Thomas the doubter and Peter the fishermen, were all addressed in a manner suited to their dispositions. We shall now consider what terms and spirit He sent out these men to their labours.

BAPTISM.—The commission to teach presented the sea-shore studied last week preceded what we are now to consider, although on that point we may not be positive. If so it preceded for this later service, and thus enrich itself, but does not seem to be included in His discourses.
