Our Consular Service.

A PARTICULARLY valuable paper, both for information given and misinformation corrected, is that in the May number of 'The World's Work' upon 'Our Consular and Trade' from the pen of Frederick Emory, chief of the bureau of foreign commerce in the United States' department of state.

To begin with what Mr. Emory refers to in the closing sub-section of his illuminative paper—the opening of new special courses in leading educational institutions, the University of Pennsylvania being the pioneer, for training young men for the diplomatic and consular services, Mr. Emory not only admits but emphasizes the value of such academic training for the diplomatic profession, which is essentially a public profession, in which the greater degree of intellectual and social training, the better the results.

Information and Entertainment, Too.

ONE OF THE queer exhibits at Buffalo is a clock known as the 'German clock,' made at Biele, Germany. It is twelve feet high, twelve feet wide and three feet deep, with cases of solid oak, very beautifully carved and finished. The clock contains a complete calendar, which gives the date, week day, month and year as well as the interesting day of the year, the golden number, the Epact, the Roman index, the cycle of the sun, the Dominical Letter and the movable feasts, such as Easter. The upper part of the clock is a globe, representing the sun, with the equator, equinox, meridian and old age, which strike the quarters. To the right of these figures can be seen a dial showing sunrise and sunset for every day of the year also showing slowly the lengthening and shortening of each day. Above this the moon can be seen in her different phases of rotation. To the right of the clock is a globe, representing the earth, which strikes its own axis from west to east, making one revolution every twenty-four hours. In the center of the upper part of the clock the twelve hours appear successively every hour. Each dial is moved toward the center, which stands in a niche, receives the benediction, and then disappears.
