About the D. L. & W. Mines.

A part of the shafting connected with one of the hoisting carriages at the Diamond mine was disabled yesterday, and in consequence many of the employees were required to suspend work at noon. The material required to repair the shafting cannot be obtained very readily owing to the strike among the machinists, and in consequence that fact operations may be suspended for some time.

The miners are beginning to feel the effects of the strike, as there is lack of ears, owing to the number laid up for repairs.

The miners to the hoisting engine and the shaft of the claybank mine is nearly finished and work will be resumed there within a week or ten days.

Contractor Isaacs has a force of men at work laying a concrete foundation for the new steam heating plant which will be installed at the Dodge mines. The foundation for a similar plant at the Hampton is also being laid.

Meeting of Newsboys' Union.

The bootblacks' and newsboys' union met last night in Greenway hall and conducted a regular weekly session. The youngsters are arranging for an entertainment and hope to hold it next month. A number of them were in Wilkes-Barre Sunday conferring with the Lazear boys' union, and a joint meeting and entertainment of the two branches may be soon held.

The newsboys, who comprise the far most active part of the local union, state that the "route boys" are now being admitted to membership. The "newsies" further express themselves as highly delighted with the action of the "shiners" in taking a decided stand on the boot blacking question and demanding a uniform price of ten cents.

Organizing the Rockmen.

Organizer Joseph Hodgson, of the United Rockmen branch of the American Federation of Labor, met a large number of rock workers last evening at the corner of South Main avenue and Hampton street, and talked over plans for the formation of a permanent organization.

About thirty-five men employed by the different mine contractors have signed their intention of affiliating with the organization, and another meeting will be held next Sunday afternoon to perfect the arrangements, but a formal talk was held last evening, but Mr. Hodgson expects to establish a permanent union at the next meeting.
