PAN-AMERICAN EISTEDDFOD

WILL BE HELD AT BUFFALO EXPOSITION ON SEPT. 19.

\$1,000 in Prizes Will Be Offered for the Choral Competitions—\$400 for Mixed Choir of Not More Than 150 Voices—\$150 for Male Party. Odd Fellows Return from Gettysburg—Preparations for the Cantata, "Daniel"—Tennis Club Doings—Notes and Personal.

The Pan-American eisteddfod, or "Welsh day," at the Buffalo exposition will be held on Thursday, September 19, when \$1,000 in prizes will be offered for choral competitions. The adjudicators and officers of the day have been appointed and are as follows:

Adjudicators: William Amstutz, of Chicago, Ill.; Edward Burrows, of Montreal, Canada; John Lane, of Buffalo, N. Y. President: Morning session, D. B. Thomas, of Meigs; afternoon session, H. C. Roberts, of Washington, D. C.; evening session, General Thomas L. Jones, of New York.

The official programme arranged is as follows: Choral Competitions. For mixed choir of not less than 20 nor over 150 voices. \$400 to be offered. "Woe, the Storm" (Handel). First prize, \$100; second prize, \$60.

Male Chorus Competition. For chorists of not less than 30 nor over 150 voices. \$150 to be offered. "Woe, the Storm" (Handel). First prize, \$50; second prize, \$30.

Female Chorus Competition. For chorists of not less than 10 nor over 50 voices. \$150 to be offered. "Woe, the Storm" (Handel). First prize, \$50; second prize, \$30.

Single Song Competition. For chorists of not less than 10 nor over 50 voices. \$150 to be offered. "Woe, the Storm" (Handel). First prize, \$50; second prize, \$30.
