BOARD OF HEALTH SENDS OUT WARNING

Alive to the Danger of a Spread of the Small Pox Epidemic in Luzerne County, the Members Admonish Residents to Be Vaccinated—Action at Last Night's Special Meeting.

Anticipating the spread of smallpox, now epidemic in Luzerne county, the Carbondale Board of Health, in session last night, specially called to move in this direction, issued a warning to the residents of this community to undergo vaccination, if not already vaccinated, and to take the same precaution with respect to their children.

The matter was thoroughly canvassed, and while there is no reason to become alarmed, yet the members felt that prudence dictated the steps which they urge through this notice.

It was decided also to forward a circular letter to the physicians of the city notifying them of the action of the board in admonishing the public of the necessity of vaccination and advising the medical men to be prepared with a supply of vaccine in the event of the expected response to the public order.

The action which the board took last night is as far as this body could proceed in carrying out the idea of vaccination, under existing circumstances at least.

So far as the school children are concerned, the board has no means, even if it were necessary, and there is no thought of such a thing as vaccination. The penalty is to keep them from attending school, but as the schools will close next week this would lose its force.

It was expected that there will be any hesitation in complying with the request of the board, which is acting solely in the interest of the public health, and a ready compliance on all sides is one of the first results expected from the issuance of the admonition conveyed in this article.
