

New York, July 17 .- Early knowledge of the erms of Mr. Morgan's letter naming the new members of the board of directors of the Northern Pacific to be created was undoubtedly the cause of the emphatic recovery in the prices of stocks today. The first intimation of the news came to the street through the open buying of and amounts of stock by Morgan and Harriman brokers. The fact of this huying was evidence of the satisfaction feit by both parties to the North-ern Pacific contest over the terms of settlement provided for by Mr. Morgan's action, aside from the strong assurance felt from the personality of the new members of the board that a fair and satisfactory adjustment would be secured. The immediate reconstruction of the board rather than to await the results meeting in October tian to await the results meeting in October than to await the regular meeting in October was an additional cause of relief to the specula-tive mind. The conviction that an early settle-ment of the Northern Pacific controversy was at hand, which permeated the market all the morn-ing, was crystallized by the rather spectacular device of a sale of two hundred shares of North of the residence of Rev.
