The Delaware, Luckawanna and Western radroad covers the greater part of the Lackawanna and Wyoming regions, from which is produced nearly per cent, of the anthracite coal, Their collieries are located at Scranton and vicinity, Wilkes-Barre, Plymouth, Avendale and Nanticoke.
