FLED FROM A WIFE'S WRATH

JEALOUS WOMAN CHASED HUSBAND WITH A KNIFE.

But for the Timely Interference of a Bartender a Tragedy Might Have Been Recorded—Browns and Mochos Play Today—Four Glee Clubs Entered in Labor Day Competition. Mrs. Campbell Died from Her Injuries—Social Events—Other Notes and Personals.

The residents of West Lackawanna avenue, between Sixth and Seventh streets, were thrown into a flutter of excitement last evening, when a well-known woman residing in that locality was seen pursuing her husband with a big butcher knife, that quite resembled a Filipino bolo.

From what could be learned of the case, the wife is extremely jealous of the husband, and was under the impression that he had been out with another woman and was drinking with her in a saloon in that locality. The wife entered the saloon in search of the husband, but before she reached him the bartender intercepted her, and put her out of the place.

In the meantime the husband made good his escape, and when the police put in an appearance the woman had also disappeared. A diligent search was made for her, but no trace of her could be found.

Died from Her Injuries.

Mrs. Ann Campbell, the aged woman who fell down stairs at her home on South Bromley avenue a week ago and sustained injuries which rendered her unconscious, died at an early hour yesterday morning.

Her extreme age and the severe shock she sustained by falling militated against her chances of recovery, and she succumbed to the inevitable. Deceased was nearly 80 years of age, and had been a resident of West Scranton for over a third of a century.

She is survived by two sons, Frank and James, and three daughters, Mrs. Thomas Shields, Mrs. Walter Haggerty and Miss Eleanor Campbell.

The funeral will take place tomorrow morning. Services will be held in St. Patrick's Catholic church, and interment made in the Cathedral cemetery.
