NEWS OF FIRE DEPARTMENT

NEW SUPERINTENDENT OF FIRES IN CHARGE.

Will Spend This Week Getting Acquainted with the Department and Ascertaining Its Needs-New First Class Steamer Recently Purchased by the City Has Been Received. It Will Probably Be Tested Today. Steamer Will Be Housed at the Nay Aug Building.

H. F. Ferher, the new superintendnt of the bureau of fires, assumed the luties of his office on Saturday morning, although his appointment did not actually go into effect until 6 o'clock that night. F. W. Zizelmann, the retiring chief, desired to go to Buffalo on Saturday morning, and Chief Ferber agreed to take up his duties a little earlier than necessary.

The new chief said yesterday that he would establish headquarters at the Nay Aug engine house. His office hours at the city hall will be from 9 to 11 a. m. for the present. He will devote the larger part of his time this week in making an inspection of the several hose and engine houses and in becoming acquainted with the permaent men.

He said that he contemplates a numper of changes in the management of the department, but desires to say nothing about them for the present. Craddock Morris, who was appointed as clerk of the department by former Chief Zizelmann and who was incorreatly reported last week as having resigned, is to be retained by Chief Fer-

Former Chief F. W. Zizelmann has accepted a position as clerk in the freight department of the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western company. and will assume his duties as soon as he returns from the Pan-American exposition, for which he left on Satur-day, Before he became chief of the department he was employed in a similar capacity by the company.

The new first-class steamer purchased by the city from the American Fire Engine company arrived here on Saturday over the Delaware and Hudson railroad and is lying on a car near the station, awaiting the arrival of the company's agent and engineer, who are expected to arrive today for the purpose of making a test of the new piece of apparatus.

This test is to be a very thorough one. The steamer will be attached to a fire hydrant in the central part of the city and an effort thus made to ascertain whether or not the water loyed. pressure is sufficient to allow it to be operated at its highest rate. Its pumping capacity will also be tested in the pumping of water from the river.

The new steamer has a pumping capacity of 1.100 gallons a minute, or 300 gallons more than the Crystal steamer, which is at present the argest in the city. It is built more for ervice than for show and is not very wetty to look upon, its boiler being nameled a dull black, instead of being nickel-plated. D. J. Slowe, call man at the Nay Aug Engine company, is to be the engineer.






