# **ARABIAN WOMAN BADLY INJURED**

RUN DOWN ON THE RAILROAD YESTERDAY.

An Arabian woman whose name could not be learned, was run over by a train of cars on the Hampton branch of the Lackawarna railroad yesterday afternoon and had a narrow escape from instant death. As it was she suffered the lost of her right arm and a fracture of the right leg. and her death may yet result from her

The woman was a peddier and had been selling goods in the Keyser val-On her way home she encountered a train of cars standing on the Hampiton bearich. She attempted to erawl underneath the cars, and when half way across the tracks the train started up, injuring her in a frightful

One of the mine ambulances was summoned and the injured woman was taken to the West Side hospital. There it was learned that her right arm had been cut off near the shoulder and there was a compound comminuted fracture of the right leg. The woman also suffered severely from the loss of blood. Her condition is critical. The woman resides on Ninth street
