OPINION IN TAYLOR CASE

PART OF LACKAWANNA TOWN-SHIP CAN BE ANNEXED.

Judge Kelly Approves of the Finding of the Grand Jury-He Says the Opposition to the Annexation Comes Entirely from the Township and School District, Not a Single Resident or Land Owner in the District to Be Annexed Appears in Opposition.

In an opinion handed down yesterday Judge John P. Kelly approves the finding of the grand jury, which declared in favor of the annexation of certain lands of Lackawanna township to Taylor borough, and the long-drawn out fight on the part of the township to prevent the secession is now at ar

The opinion, which recites the hismy of the litigation is appended in

On the 6th day of May, 1901, a peti-ion was presented by certain resident free-holders of the territory therein described, praying that such territory lying in the township of Lackawanna be annexed to the borough of Taylor, and on the same day an order was made referring the matter to the grand jury. On the 9th day of May the grand jury made a report that, the grand jury made a report that, after a full investigation, they "find the conditions of the act of assembly passed June 11, 1879, entitled 'a supplement to an act for the regulation of boroughs, approved the 3d day of April, A. D. 1851, and all other acts relating thereto,' have been complied with, and believe that it is expedient to grant the prayer of the petitioners;" which report was confirmed alsi on the 29th day of May. On the 6th and 8th days of May exceptions were filed on behalf of the township of and 8th days of May exceptions were filed on behalf of the township of Lackawanna, and on behalf of the school district of Lackawanna town-ship, respectively, upon which action was deferred until after the grand jury should report. On May 23d ex-ceptions on behalf of the township and school district were filed to the report of the grand jury, and on June 17 are application for further investigation was presented for reasons therein stated. The grand jury having reported in favor of the petitioners, all these exceptions, as well as the petition for further investigation, are now to be disposed of.

ONE CONTENTION.

It is contended on the part of the exceptants that the petitioners are not residents and inhabitants of the lots, outlets and tracts of land which are sought to be annexed to the borough, and that their lands are not adfacent to the borough or to each other within the meaning of the act. The facts are that with the exception of some thirty village lots, which have beer sold to sundry persons, the whole of the territory sought to be annexed is owned by the Delaware, Lackawan-na and Western Railroad company. None of the lots owned by individuals are located on the boundary line of the borough, and all of the lands in the territory proposed to be annexed which are immediately adjacent to the borough are owned by that company. The argument on the part of the exreptants is that, inasmuch as none of the petitioners are owners of lands immediately adjoining the borough the petition and proceedings do not come within the provisions of this act We do not read the act in that way It provides that "when an application ants of any lots, outlots or other tracts of land adjacent to a borough he annexed to said borough, it shall be in writing and shall be signed by a majority of the free-holders residing

within the limits to be annexed." We do not think it was contemplated by the legislature that the wishes of the majority of the free-holders resid-ing within the limits of certain terriory sought to be annexed should be frustrated or defeated on account of the opposition or even non-residence f the owner of a strip of land which night happen to be the only part of the territory immediately adjacent to the borough. "The power of the courts is not restricted to the amexation of 'lots and outlots' in the popular sense of the words. These powers extend to tracts of land,' and a tract of land may either apply to a single farm or to a territory embracing the lands of different adjoining owners drawn and exhibited in a single draft. It may ap-propriately be applied to a section of land or of the country without reference to the lines of individual owner-ship.

WHAT THE LAW IS.

The Act of June 11, 1879, is a supplement to the general borough law of April 3, 1851, P. L. 329, which in its thirtieth section authorizes the burgess and town council of any borough upon petition, etc., to annex 'lots, out-
