

### REVOLVER, KNIFE AND RAZOR.

The old man was prepared and well fortified to resist if he was so inclined. and it is not unlikely that he would have done so had he the opportunity He had on his person when taken loaded revolver, a knife and a razor. By this circumstance, he sustained the reputation that he bears of having an inordinate desire to have firearms about him.

Cohb was about fitteen feet away when Constable Robinson hailed him. He realized that it would be useless to attempt an escape or resistance, but in his confusion he started off on a quick, active step. He was sternly halted by the officer and then mockly submitted to arrest. The constable led Cobb to his carriage and drove to the city, where he lodged his prisoner in a cell in the city Jail.

#### PATHETIC FEATURES OF CASE.

At 10 o'clock, a couple of hours after his arrival at the city jail, Cobb was taken before Alderman Jones and arraigned. The old man presented a pitiable appearance and even those who were loudest in their denunciation of his wild act at the time of its happening, were forced to kind-hearted sympathy for him in his present Splight. He is now past sixty-five years.
