TRIED BEFORE ELEVEN JURORS

RUFUS J. FOSTER SUMMONED TO HARRISBURG.

Aggie Cannon, a 17-year-old girl, had been arrested in company with a couple of drunken men for raising a disturbance in a Providence street car.

As the iron door closed on her she burst forth into an uncontrollable and wild flood of tears.

"What's the matter, little girl?" asked Captain Dick gently.

"I'm thinking of my poor mother in Hazleton, and of my brothers and sisters," replied the sobbing prisoner as she made an effort to control herself.

"Why didn't I take mother's advice, Oh, my God, why didn't I? She said she'd forgive me if I tried to reform, but I went down town. Why didn't I stay at home?"

"I've only been out of jail since morning. I was charged with larceny but the grand jury ignored the bill and they let me out today. I had no place to go. Nothing to do and the wife of one of these men promised to give me money. I went to the jail. I went with her and her husband and they got me to drink beer."

"For God's sake don't let them send me to the jail again. I've been there for three months and if I ever go again I'll go to the county jail for thirty days in default of a fine of \$10." Frank Jordan and Reese Price, the two men arrested with her, were also sent up.
