TRIED BEFORE **ELEVEN JURORS**

RUFUS J. FOSTER SUMMONED TO HARRISBURG.

Attorneys in the Case of V. M. Boelchi Against De Lourent & Company Agreed to Have It Proceed with One Less Than the Usual Number of Jurors-William Repp Takes an Appeal from the Report of the Old Forge Auditors-Court Notes-Marriage Licenses.

Before Judge J. P. Kelly, the case of V. M. Boelchi against DeLourent & Company, a feigned issue, which was called for trial Monday afternoon, occupied all of yesterday. A. de Villeneuve, of New York, some time ago bought a large amount of raw silk from De Lourent & Company also of New York. The bill for the silk was \$4,000 and was not paid. Some time after this DeVilleneuve sold a quantity of goods to the Worsted Silk company, of Taylor, and De Lourent learning of this in October of last year secured a writ of foreign attachment to secure the money owed by the Tay-

lor company to De Villeneuve. At this juncture V. M. Boelchi, another New York silk dealer, appeared upon the scene with an assignment of the claim against the Taylor people De Lourent & Company alleges that De Villeneuve and Boelchi are silent partners and that the assignment was not fixed up until they heard of the writ of attachment of De Lourent & Company. The case will be given to the jury this morning. The plaintiff was represented by Attorneys H. A Knapp and C. P. O'Malley and the defendants by Attorneys G. T. Kirby, of New York, and J. E. Burr and T. F.

Rufus J. Foster, one of the jurors in the case, received a telegram from Harrisburg, summoning him to that place at once. The attorneys agreed to have the case go on before eleven jurors and Judge Kelly excused Mr.

Foster. Before Judge Carpenter yesterday verdict in favor of the defendant was directed in the case of Annie L. Newell against John L. Roe. No appearance being made for the plaintiff in the case of C. Fruchan, manager, against Staples & Kieth, a non sult was allowed by the court.

Stevens objected strenuously to this as did also the alleged Davison, Finally Mrs. pared tomorrow. Keller gave in and Davison bound the bargain by handing Mrs. Keller \$5. This happened Friday afternoon, August 30. Saturday morning, August 31, Stevens had moved away to a house in Green Ridge. That afternoon the alleged Davison telephone Mrs. Keller that his goods were attached at Reading for three months arrears in the rent, and that he could not take the house. Subsequent inves tigation revealed that no man by the name of C. P. Davison has lived in

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
