
PITTSTON.

New York, Oct. 4.—The accontricities of the industrial stocks continued to be a disturbing factor in the stock market today. Yesterday's list of semi-demoralized stocks was increased today by a number which were not tested yesterday during the progress of liquidation. The low-priced non-dividend paying railroad stocks were also in marked disfavor and suffered severe declines on selling out of holdings. But the still more potent factor toward re-action was the renewed pressure to liquidate in Amalgamated Copper, which carried the price down an extreme 24, to 864, which is the lowest price on the present movement, even allowing for the 11g per cent, interest which has come off. Other stocks notably affected were: General Electric, 5%; Diamond Match, 5: United States Express, 47s. onsolidated Gas. 1; National Biscuit preferred. 3; Sugar, 21g, and Smelling, 25g. In the low-priced railroad stocks, Lake Erie and Western lost Ma; St. Joseps and Grand Island second pre-ferred, 41g.
