The members of the United Mine Workers of Carbondale and vicinity will celebrate Tuesday, Oct. 29, "John Mitchell Day," with a big parade in this city.

The First Anthracite district has been subdivided into four sections for the event. No. 1 sub-district includes all that territory from Jessup to Forest City, comprising thirty locals with a membership of 10,000 men.

Carbondale being the central and most accessible point in the sub-district, it was decided to hold the Mitchell demonstration here.
