Wall Street Review.

New York, Oct. 10.—There was a notable revival of speculation in the stock market today following the evening and hesitating movement of the last day or two.

Very much of the market became affected in an increasing degree and in the latter part of the day it became fairly buoyant and closed with a strong upward movement.

The market was not so strong at about the level. This sudden outburst of speculation at a reversal of the recently current sentiment caused a circulation of many rumors and gave rise to a supposition of some important financial world not yet disclosed to the public.

The rumors centered about supposed further developments in the northwestern railroad world and early took the form of a plan for an adjustment with the Canadian Pacific which might eliminate competition.

The trans-continental stocks which had been somewhat neglected in the early strength leaped into activity and strength. Great Northern preferred advanced 1/2 cent to 106 1/2.

Union Pacific advanced 1/4 cent to 115 1/4. Northern Pacific advanced 1/4 cent to 115 1/4.
