GREAT DAY AT BLOOMSBURG

FULLY 30,000 SPECTATORS WIT-NESS RACING EVENTS.

Something Doing Every Minute and All Are Well Repaid for Their Journey-Track Trials the Main Features of Attraction and the Grand Stand Is Too Small to Hold All of the Would-Be Patrons-Review of the Races.

Second to the Scranton Tribung.

Bloomsburg, Pa., Oct. 11,-Today was a great one on the grounds of the Columbia County Fair association. A crown of fully 30,000 spectators were visitors, and they were well repaid for their journey, for there was "some-thing doing" every minute. The multitude of shows and small theatres on the midway, the various games of chance and skill, and, most of all, the harness races, proved magnets that attracted and pleased.

The mammoth grand stand, with its seating expacity of 5,000, proved utterly inadequate to accommodate the great throngs that tried to gain admittance, and at 1.30 o'clock the ticket sellers stopped selling. Although there are upward of a dozen restauswamped with hurgry patrons and long waits were the rule for all who did not possess enough foresight to bring luncheons with them.

There were two bands of music on the grounds in the afternoon. The Bloomsburg band played from a grandstand near the main exhibition hall, while the Catawissa band made things lively from the judges' stand, directly opposite the grand stand.

There was racing enough to suit the most ardent horseman during the aftermoon. Six heats were necessary to decide the first race, the 2.13 pace, the first four heats going to three different Jay B. eventually won the race by an extremely narrow margin. The second race, a 2.21 pace, had ten starters and was picked up in straight heats by Luclia Mc, from Stormstown Pa. Horses from the vicinity of Scranton did not cut much of a figure, although there were some from that lo-

THE MARKETS.

Wall Street Review. New York, Oct. 10.-There was a notable revival of speculation in the stock market today following the wavring and hesitating movement of the department of the market became affeeted in an increasing degree and in the late dealings the market became fairly buoyant and closed active and strong at about the top level. This sudden outburst of speculation at reversal of the recently current senti ment caused a circulation of many rumors and gave rise to a supposition of some important development in the financial world not yet disclosed to the public. The rumors centered about supposed further developments in the northwestern railroad world and early took the form of a plan for an adjustment with the Canadian Pacific which eliminate competition. trans-Continental stocks which had been somewhat neglected in the early strength leaped into activity and strength. Great Northern preferred jumped 8 points to 196%, Northern Pa-cific preferred and Chicago and Northwestern 3; St. Paul, 2% and Union Pacific 2%. There was a renewed heavy demand for the stocks also, which lifted them 1% to 4 points. This culmination of the day's bullish tendency (caused a rush to cover by the bears. The demand from this source showed a state bordering on demoralization on the part of the large short interest in the market. The majority of active stocks are a point or more higher. The coalers showed the first marked evidence of strength, New Jersey Central jumping seven points and others of the group 10 to 4.
