SCHLEY'S SIDE OF THE CASE

Evidence Produced Yesterday More Favorable to Commander of Flying Squadron.

SUPPRESSED DISPATCH IS NOT ADMITTED

The Communication from Schley Which Failed to Reach Secretary Long Is Ruled Out of Court—Captain Cook Is Recalled and Gives Important Testimony Concerning the Conduct of Admiral Schley During the Engagement at Santiago—He Was Cool, Brave and Enthusiastic According to Witnesses.

By Exclusive Wire from The Associated Press. Washington, Oct. 15.—Only one new witness was heard in detail by the Schley court of inquiry today. This was Lieutenant Commander James H. Cook, who was Admiral Schley's flag lieutenant during the Spanish war. He gave a detailed account of the entire Cuban campaign, including the brief siege of Centinogos, the retrograde movement of the flying squadron in search of food, the discovery of Santiago, the reconnaissance of the Santiago shore batteries and the bombardment of the Cristobal Colon July 21, and the battle of Santiago July 31, when Cervera's fleet was destroyed. He placed the distance out of the blockading line at Centinogos at from one to four miles and at Santiago at from three to six miles. He expressed the opinion that in the battle of July 31 it had been the Viscaya's intention to ram the Brooklyn.

Dispatch Ruled Out

Mr. Raynor sought to secure the introduction of a brief report of the battle of July 31. Commodore Schley prepared for transmission to the secretary of the navy.
