An ordinance was introduced last night in select council, giving W. S. Langstaff the contract for taking away garbage from the seventh, eighth, ninth, thirteenth, sixteenth, seventeenth and parts of the first and second wards. Mr. Langstaff agrees to pay the city \$250 a year for ten years for the privilege and to give a bond in the sum of \$1000.


