ACCIDENTALLY SHOT IN SIDE

RICHARD EVANS THE VICTIM OF AMATEUR MARKSMAN.

While Walking Through the Round Woods Yesterday He Was Hit with a Stray Bullet—Busman Cramer Had a Narrow Escape from Injury. Driscoll's Horse Won the Race. The First Baptist Church Services. Funeral of Miss Mulherin—Other Events of Interest.

Richard Evans, of Dodge avenue, was the victim of an accidental shooting yesterday morning, and as a result he now lies in the Scranton Private hospital, suffering from a gunshot wound in his left side.

From what could be learned of the circumstances, several young men from Park Hill, whose names could not be learned, were hunting in the Round Woods in company with a young man named Whiting, a resident of Besant street.

A shot was fired at a tree and the charge evidently missed its mark and struck Evans, hitting the injury above stated. As soon as possible, the injured man was assisted to his home and afterwards removed to the hospital.

The shooting was purely accidental, so far as the police were able to learn, and no arrests have been made.

The bullet entered the left side and lodged in the pleural cavity. Dr. Barrie, of the hospital staff, said last night that the injured man would probably recover, though he admitted that the injury is a very serious one.
