THE MARKETS.

Wall Street Review.

New York, Oct. 31.—Except for special movements in a few individual stocks, today's market ran down near to stagnation many times. There was no real business done, and the market to a lower level on account of the paralysis of demand. The central cause of this state of affairs was the news that the government had bought the bank of England to 4 per cent, compared with the three per cent, rate which has maintained since June 12 last. This gave a reliable notice that further demands are pending upon the bank's stock of gold which the rise in the discount rate is intended to protect by diverting the demand upon New York. No doubt was entertained that this object will be achieved. In fact, arrangements were already perfected today for shipments of gold to Paris for the purpose of checking the French demand for their reserves and as clearly the necessity of the latter for recuperation. The news was doubt as to the extent to which the foreign demand would be met, and the possibility of a general enthusiasm. Hopes are professed that tomorrow's market will be more active, but it is not clear that the news of the government's purchase of the bank of England will be sufficient to revive any feeling of cheerfulness in the stock market. Among the stock advances today without any special reason assigned were Lackawanna, Delaware and Hudson, a number of the Vanderbilts and Chesapeake and Ohio, the rest on the Philadelphia and Pennsylvania railroad account.

There were some strong spots in the bond market, but the price movement was irregular. Total sales, per value, \$1,000,000. U. S. bonds were all unchanged on the last call.
