CORPORAL BRINK
WAS ARRESTED

Is Accused of Larceny and False Pretense by Captain E. H. F. Conrad and A. J. Breig.

Corporal Lawrence Brink, of Company A, Thirteenth regiment, was arrested yesterday on charges of false pretense and larceny, preferred by Captain E. H. F. Conrad, of Company A, and Albert J. Breig.

The charge preferred by Captain Conrad is that of larceny. He alleges that he cashed a check for \$40, drawn by Brink on the "Tradest" National bank, and that he discovered next day that he had no account with the bank.

Brink, who is also accused of false pretense, denies that Brink, who is a contractor, engaged him to work on a building which he was constructing for Dr. E. E. Carty, in Dimmone, and that he gave him payment on account of Dr. Carty in the sum of \$75, which amount he claimed the doctor owed him.

He claims that when he presented this order to Dr. Carty that the latter laughed at him and declared that he owed Brink nothing.

Brig also alleges that Brink gave him, in part payment for his work, a check for \$10 on the Dime Deposit and Discount bank, which afterwards proved to be absolutely worthless.

Brink waived a hearing and was held in \$300 bail on each charge by Magistrate Howe.

NEARLY 1,000 MEMBERS.

Railroad Young Men's Christian Association Growing Rapidly.

The annual membership census of the Railroad Young Men's Christian association is progressing well, and upwards of two hundred new members have been received in the past four weeks. This gives the department a total membership of 352. The present aim is to bring this up to one thousand before the close of the year.
