SOUTH SCRANTON

PUPILS OF NO. 2 SCHOOL WENT ON STRIKE.

They Object Because the Principal, William Fitzgerald, Rode to the School in a Street Car—Similar Trouble at No. 3 Because Miss Mackay Patronized the Cars—Leak in a Gas Main Caused Much Annoyance at Cedar Avenue and Birch Street—Aldermanic Cases.

The limit has at last been reached in regard to strikers in this vicinity, and yesterday at noon the pupils of No. 2 school which is located on Orchard street turned out en masse because their principal, William Fitzgerald, rode on the street cars.

The trouble had been brewing from the day previous when some observing youngster noticed the principal get off a Stone avenue car near the school and the fact was quickly circulated throughout the building. He had occasion during the morning session to call upon one of the boys to raise a window blind and was somewhat startled when the little fellow refused. On demanding an explanation the youngster told him he could do nothing for him because he rode on the cars.
