NIGHT SCHOOLS ARE NOW OPEN

ATTENDANCE INCREASING AT EACH SESSION.

Competent Teachers in Charge of the Work at Nos. 13, 16, 17, 18, 31 and 32 Buildings—Observance of Thanksgiving Day Generally Expected—C. T. A. U. Societies Arranging for an Encampment—Republican Club Meeting and Other Events This Evening—Future Happenings—Notes and Personals.

Public night schools have been opened in a number of the city school buildings, and a large number of factory hands, booker boys and mine workers are availing themselves of the opportunity to obtain education in the common English branches.

The enrollment this far has been very good, but there is still room for many more who may desire to attend. At No. 13 school the work is in charge of J. H. Olyer and Miss Elizabeth Williams. In the No. 16 building, on Chestnut street, Thomas Murphy, Jr. is in charge.

Miss Mary Durkin has charge of the work at No. 17, in the Kuyper Valley section, and Wallace G. Moser and Miss Ida Evans are teaching at No. 18 building, corner of South Main and Summer streets.

At No. 31, Jackson street and Van Buren avenue, there are four teachers, as this is a thickly populated district. The instructors are: H. L. Morgan, W. H. Williams, J. T. Davis and E. K. Hughes. In the No. 32 building, on South Main street, John Thomas and Miss Kate O'Neill.
