The or-dinance awarding contract for lighting the streets to the Lackawanna Valley Electric company was introduced, I; was referred to the light, fire and water committee to report forthwith. But one member of that committee was present. W. H. Masters, and he reported favorably. The councilmen were in doubt as to the legality of the report on account of but one committeeman being present, and City Solicitor Smart was called in and gave his opinion that ouncils could take action on the one man's report. The ordinance passed on first and second reading.

The following resolution, by Mr. Stone, was read and referred to proper committee: That the city clerk advertise for proposals for the painting and erecting of street signs on the streets where there are no signs, and that the city ensineer be instructed to furnish a list of streets to bidders. Mr. Thompson wanted information in relation to the testing of the fire alarm system He was appointed by the chair a committee of one to notify P. H. Gilleran, the electrician, to appear before council at their next regular meeting. Mr. Masters thought that the counellmen ought to take some action in regard to the boys making "slides" of the sidewalks.
